





TNPSC BITS

❖ Doordarshan has been honoured with the award in the Electronic Media category for its comprehensive campaign on Voter Awareness and Education.

TAMIL NADU

Additional rice allocation - Tamilnadu



- ❖ The Tamil Nadu Civil Supplies Corporation has sought from the Food Corporation of India (FCI) allocation of nine lakh tonnes of rice for meeting the shortfall in its requirements.
- ❖ The reserve price of rice had been fixed at ₹22.5 per kg (pan-India) for sale to State governments.
- ❖ Two years ago, the Centre hiked the price for the States to ₹34 per kg from ₹23 a kg and in June 2023.
- ❖ It had even suspended the sale of rice and wheat to the States.





❖ As against the monthly allocation of 2.97 lakh tonnes for Tamil Nadu, the average monthly offtake of rice is around 3.63 lakh tonnes.

NATIONAL

SC verdict on residence-based quota

The Supreme Court ruled that residencebased reservations for PG medical seats are unconstitutional.

This violates Article 14 of the Constitution. Seats under the state quota must be filled based solely on NEET exam merits.

Current students and graduates with existing domicile reservations will not be impacted.

The judgment underscores the importance of merit-based admissions for specialized PG medical courses.

- ❖ The Supreme Court held that the residence-based reservation for admission to postgraduate (PG) medical courses within the State quota is invalid.
- ❖ It stated that it ran counter to the very idea of one citizenship for all and right to equality under the Constitution.
- ❖ The court acknowledged that though residence-based reservation was allowed to a reasonable degree for MBBS courses.
- ❖ The court pointed out how States use 'domicile' as a synonym for 'residence'.
- ❖ Legally, 'domicile' did not mean the 'place of residence' of an individual.
- ❖ The concept of regional or provincial domicile is alien to the Indian legal system.
- ❖ Permanent residence or residence have a meaning which is different from that of 'domicile'.
- ❖ Tamil Nadu implements 69% reservation.
- ❖ It reserves 50% of the seats for students who are native to the State or were born in the State.





- ❖ In PG courses (MD/MS/Diploma), there is a total of 2,294 seats in Tamilnadu.
- ❖ Of this, 50% seats have been reserved for students of Tamil Nadu, benefiting nearly 1,200 students.

INTERNATIONAL

Pashmina Festival 2025

- ❖ The first three-day International Pashmina Festival cum Exhibition organised by Nepal Pashmina Industries Association in Kathmandu, Nepal.
- ❖ Pashmina is hand-combed from the undercoat of Chyangra goats during their natural shedding season.
- ❖ Nepali Pashmina is marketed as "Chyangra Pashmina" to emphasize its superior quality.


Principal Purpose Test (PPT)

- ❖ The Central Board of Direct Taxes (CBDT) has issued the updated guidance for the application of the Principal Purpose Test (PPT) under India's Double Taxation Avoidance Agreements (DTAAs).
- ❖ It exempts certain provisions under the India-Cyprus DTAA, India-Mauritius DTAA, and India-Singapore DTAA.
- ❖ PPT is a part of international tax rules aimed at preventing misuse of tax treaties.
- ❖ It is a key provision under the Multilateral Convention to Implement Tax Treaty related provisions to prevent Base Erosion and Profit Shifting (BEPS).





❖ DTAAs are bilateral treaties aimed at preventing the same income from being taxed twice.



Temporary Identification Number - CBIC

CBIC INTRODUCES TEMPORARY IDENTIFICATION NUMBER (TIN) IN GST RULES

The Ministry of Finance has amended the CGST Rules, 2017, introducing Rule 16A to enable issuance of Temporary Identification Numbers (TIN) for non-registered entities fulfilling GST payment obligations.

❖ The Central Board of Indirect Taxes and Customs (CBIC) has notified a new amendment to GST rules.





- ❖ It aims to issue TIN to entities that are not required to register under the GST Act but need to make payments under some specific provision.
- ❖ Under Goods and Services Tax (GST) rules, registration is mandatory for businesses with an annual turnover of ₹40 lakh and ₹20 lakh in the manufacturing and services sectors, respectively.

eCoO 2.0 system

What's new?

- Exporters can now assign multi-user access under a single Importer Exporter Code (IEC).
- In addition to the digital signature token,
 Aadhaar-based e-signing would be available.
- A common integrated dashboard will provide seamless access to eCoO and other related services.
- ❖ The Directorate General of Foreign Trade (DGFT) has launched the enhanced Certificate of Origin (eCoO) 2.0 System.
- ❖ It is a significant upgrade designed to simplify the certification process for the exporters and enhance trade efficiency.
- ❖ This upgraded platform offers several user-friendly features, such as multi-user access, which enables exporters to authorize multiple users under a single Importer Exporter Code (IEC).
- ❖ As of 1st January 2025, the electronic filing of Non-Preferential Certificates of Origin has become mandatory via the eCoO 2.0 platform.
- ❖ The Certificates of Origin (CoO) authenticates the origin of exported goods.

SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY

NVS-02 - 100th Mission from Sriharikota

❖ ISRO on January 29, 2025 launched its historic 100th launch from the Satish Dhawan Space Centre in Sriharikota.






- ❖ The GSLV-F15 with the NVS-02 satellite lifted off from the spaceport's second launch pad.
- ❖ NVS-02 is the second satellite in the NVS series.
- ❖ The GSLV-F15 is the 17th flight of India's Geosynchronous Satellite Launch Vehicle (GSLV) and 11th flight with Indigenous Cryo stage.
- ❖ It is the 8th operational flight of GSLV with an indigenous Cryogenic stage.
- ❖ The first launch, on August 10, 1979, was the experimental flight of the Satellite Launch Vehicle-3 (SLV-3 E10) carrying the Rohini Technology Payload.



World's 1st deep sea radar



Chinese scientists claim to have developed the world's first seabed 'radar' capable of detecting high-altitude aircraft.






- ❖ It could significantly enhance China's intelligence network and reshape future naval warfare.
- ❖ It is an acoustic sensor array positioned on the seabed at a depth of 1,000 metres.
- ❖ It has reportedly detected and tracked a fixed-wing aircraft flying at an altitude of 5,000 metres.
- ❖ China already operates a satellite network capable of tracking aircraft globally, including US F-22 stealth fighters.

Elephant in Namdapha National Park




- ❖ An elephant has been camera-trapped in India's easternmost tiger reserve-Namdapha National Park and Tiger Reserve after 12 years.
- ❖ The last such sighting was in 2013.
- ❖ Namdapha National Park is located in the Changlang district of Arunachal Pradesh.





- ❖ It was established in 1983 and it is also recognised as a biodiversity hotspot.
- ❖ The park is home to over 1,000 plant species and approximately 1,400 animal species.

Olive Ridley turtles in Rushikulya mouth



- ❖ The Olive Ridley turtles had skipped the River Rushikulya mouth in Odisha's Ganjam district in 2024 for the mass nesting.
- * Rushikulya river mouth is one of the major rookeries in the country, where millions of female Olives Ridley turtles' throng for mass nesting (arribada in Spanish).
- ❖ The other sites in Odisha, where mass nesting of the Olive Ridleys take place are Gahirmatha and Deve river mouth in Kendrapara and Puri districts, respectively.
- ❖ The mass nesting in the river mouth was missed in 2002, 2007, 2016, 2019, 2021 and 2024.


Sambhar Festival 2025

❖ With falling birth rate and increase in infant mortality rate, the population of Koragas is declining drastically.





- * Two decades ago, Koragas were 20,000 in number, now it come down to 16,000.
- ❖ The Koraga tribe is classified as a Particularly Vulnerable Tribal Group (PVTG).
- ❖ They are mainly found in the Dakshina Kannada district and Udupi districts of Karnataka.
- ❖ Earlier, the Kerala government has initiated programmes to provide nutritious food to tribal households.
- * Koragas identify them as Hindus and follow distinct tribal religious practices.
- ❖ They worship spirits known as Bhutas and believe in the power of magic and rituals.

Apple Man of India



Hariman Sharma: The Apple Man of India Revolutionizing Farming with HRMN-99

- ❖ Hariman Sharma, a farmer from Himachal Pradesh, was recently conferred with Padma Shri for his transformative contribution to Indian agriculture.
- ❖ He is popularly known as the 'Apple Man of India'.
- ❖ He revolutionised apple cultivation by developing a variety that can be cultivated under warmer conditions in the lower hills.
- ❖ It was earlier believed that apples could only be grown in the mid and the higher hills under cold conditions.
- ❖ He has developed an innovative, self-pollinating, low chilling apple variety called HRMN-99.





❖ The HRMN-99 thrives in tropical, sub-tropical, and plain regions with summer temperatures reaching 40-45°C.

Libia Lobo Sardesai

- ❖ Goan freedom fighter Libia Lobo Sardesai, 100, was honoured with the Padma Shri for her pivotal role in the state's liberation struggle.
- ❖ From 1955 to 1961, Libia and her colleague Vaman Sardesai ran an underground radio station from the jungles of the Western Ghats.
- ❖ It was she who announced the news of Goa's liberation from four-and-a-half centuries of Portuguese rule on December 19, 1961.
- ❖ On the morning of December 19, 1961, Libia and Vaman flew over Panaji in an Indian Air Force (IAF) plane with a radio transmitter aboard and a loudspeaker fitted on the plane's belly, dropping leaflets and announcing in Portuguese and Konkani that the Portuguese had surrendered.


Martyrs' Day 2025 - January 30
